

**Creating Fluid Acrylic Pour Paintings**  
**Supply List for In-Person Class**  
**Candace French**  
**Mixed Media Artist**

- 5 - 7 of 4 oz bottles or 2 - 2 oz bottles of **Fluid Acrylics** from any manufacturer in colors of your choice. **Include black and white in the 5-7 colors. Please do not bring paints that come in a tube.**
- 1 - **Quart to one Gallon of Floetrol**. Needed even if you buy the pre-mixed pouring fluid acrylics.
- 1 - 6" by 6", 8" by 8" or 10" by 10" wood panel or canvas panel.
- 3 - 5 canvases or canvas panels.
- **Palette knife** with rounded tip about 3" in length for the flat part and a **bend in the handle and a rounded tip about the size of the end of one of your small fingers.**
- Pen or pencil and notebook or journal for taking notes.
- **Pouring Pans** 3 - 5 Aluminum Full Size Steam Table Pan used for cooking turkeys.
- Clothes you can get messy.
- **Sack lunch and drink** if the class is a one day workshop.
- **\$3.00 supply fee** paid to instructor for special pouring supplies to be shared.
  
- **Art Supplies Provided by PACE**
- Disposable small 10 ounce plastic drinking cups.
- Disposable small 1 or 2 ounce plastic or paper drinking cups
- Stir sticks
- Disposable rubber gloves
- Paper towels

- **Acrylics:** Choose colors you love and/or use in your home or work space. Or, try new colors to expand your palette. Wal-Mart, JoAnn's Fabrics, Hobby Lobby, Michael's, Guiry's and Meiningers all carry the **fluid paints**. Brands, selection and prices vary by store.
- **Floetrol:** Can be found in the **paint department** of Guiry's, Home Depot, Lowe's or any hardware store. The gallon is a better value than the quart size. Plus, if you are using larger canvases, it will ensure you will have plenty of pouring medium to use.
- **Canvas boards, canvases and wood panels:** These can be a combination of 5" by 7", 8" by 10", or 10 by 12" in size. If your creative process is a fast one, more canvases are recommended. If you want to create a diptych, bring two small canvases of the same size.
- **Palette knife:** The palette knife looks like a skinny pie server because it has a bend in the handle, but, it is smaller and about **1/2 inch wide**. It can be metal or plastic.
- **Aluminum pans:** Found at Dollar Tree. These pans need to be at least 2 inches **larger on each side than your largest canvas**. You will need room for your hands to hold and lift your canvas.
